## Keynote Speaker



## Join us on Tuesday, November 9, 2021 at 9 am for a special keynote address.

Dr. Christopher Koliba is the inaugural Director of the University of Vermont (UVM) Office of Engagement (OOE) and a Full Professor in the Community Development and Applied Economics Department at UVM.

He is the lead author of Governance Network in Public Administration and Public Policy (second edition) and has published over 80 peer reviewed articles and book chapters, and has served as the principal investigator, co-principal investigator or science leader on over \$50 million in grants from federal agencies.

Dr. Koliba the Co-Director of the Social Ecological Gaming and Simulation (SEGS) Lab, the Associate Director of Vermont EPSCoR and served as the director of the Master of Public Administration Program from 2002 to 2020.

He presently sits on the Board of Directors of the Vermont Manufacturing Extension Center (VMEC), founded and directs the Sustainable Development Policy, Economics and Governance Ph.D. Program, directs the Vermont Certified Public Managers Program (VCPM), and has served as the administrative director of community-university partnership offices and centers at UVM, Georgetown University and Syracuse University, including serving as the cofounder of UVM Community-University Partnerships and Service-Learning (CUPS) Office.

Dr. Kolliba's research interests include the governance of critical infrastructure, uses of technology to incent behavior and decision making with applications to economic development, water quality, food systems, energy systems, emergency and disaster response, and

Sue Lalumiere, University of Vermont Subject: You've Got to Move It, Move It: Handling Award Transfers Pre-Award From and To Other Institutions

Overview: The transfer of an award from one institution to another is a complex and time-consuming action. Investigators who resign from one institution have several options to consider if they have sponsored funding. New faculty coming to an institution who intend to continue their active sponsored projects will have similar considerations. The process of transferring awards from one institution to another requires negotiation and collaboration across institutions including the sponsor, department and central representatives from outgoing and incoming organizations. Because award transfers affect the complete lifecycle of an award, administrators in pre, post, "one-stop-shop" settings will find this session informative.

Learning Objectives: Examine federal and non-federal transfers through examples and discussion of current trends. Learn best practices and how to keep the transfer moving forward to avoid delays and complications. Receive tips on PI communication during the award transfer process.

## Subject: Compensation Compliance Under Uniform Guidance

Overview: This session will cover the history of regulatory changes made for compensation compliance, the differences in agency instructions for budgeting compensation and how this impacts Post-Award. Participants will learn to evaluate "commitments" of time devoted vs. cost share, review the activities of faculty members that make allocations of salary difficult. Federal Agency inconsistencies to the Cost Principles and differences in auditor regulatory interpretations will be highlighted.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES: Participants will have a greater understanding of compensation compliance under the Uniform Guidance. Participants will be able to describe and utilize practices and methodologies to increase process integrity and reduce audit risk and administrative burden.

Sarah Marina. **Tufts University**  Subject: Applying Team Science Principles to Research Administration and Pre-award **Development** 

Overview: Complex proposals, such as center grants, institutional training grants, and equipment grants, require substantial institutional support. This support comes from various units, including research administration, research development, corporate and foundation relations, technology transfer, university counsel, compliance offices (IRB, IACUC), and school/ university upper administration (deans, provost, president, etc.). While these offices work for the same institution, they often have differing reporting lines, different strategies for getting things done, and their own language for their work. Strategies for these administrative teams to work together effectively are required to ensure compliance and quality. Much research has been done on the science of team science, and many institutions have begun training programs for their investigators to increase team effectiveness and grant competitiveness. Despite knowing the value of such trainings for teams of investigators, these principles for developing effective teams are not usually applied to the administrative teams supporting these proposals. In this session, we will discuss how three concepts from the science of team science applies to administrative teams: 1) developing a shared vision in support of the scientific vision of the investigators; 2) developing a shared vocabulary across diverse administrative units who often have their own specialized terminologies; and 3) understanding the motivators, detractors. These strategies will result in increased ability to break down institutional silos, thus making the processes of completing complex proposals easier. Practical solutions for assigning roles and responsibilities and communicating effectively with the investigator team will also be provided.

Overview: Research administrators and compliance managers are often responsible for a narrow segment of the university research enterprise. In this session, we will discuss which research offices should be connected and for what purpose. We will explore possible solutions to create inter-office connectivity without the need for "fancy" electronic systems or other high tech solutions. We will share some examples of "behind-the-scenes" processes and exchanges that we implemented using email and shared Google docs.
